



Palm Sunday

Assumption's Mission Statement: Love and follow Jesus. Be a disciple like Mary.

SUNDAY GOSPEL REFLECTION

The sacred events of Holy Week beg the question: Why did Jesus, the Son of God, have to suffer a cruel, unjust death on a cross? Was Jesus's suffering the only means by which humanity could be reconciled to friendship with God?

Jesus was obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. With these words, St. Paul focuses on the ultimate reason that Jesus's embraced his passion and crucifixion. Obedience to the will of God that opened the way for an outpouring of divine love on the world led Jesus to his suffering and death on the cross. Obedience was the foundation of Jesus's life. In Jesus's obedience we come to understand who God really is and who we really are, made in the image of God who loves us to the point of death, even death on a cross.

In the Gospel account of the Lord's Passion, we follow in the footsteps of the way of the cross. Soon after Jesus celebrates the Passover with his disciples, he arrives in Gethsemane to pray. During a time of deep, anguished prayer, Jesus speaks to his heavenly Father with words of obedient love: "take this cup away from me but not what I will but what you will." Obedience to the will of God becomes the fullest expression of divine love.

After Jesus expressed his obedience to God, the startling event of his betrayal follows. Judas arrives in Gethsemane with a crowd armed with swords and clubs. With a traitorous kiss, Judas betrays Jesus into the hands of those who seek to kill him in exchange for silver. Betrayal takes center stage in the final encounter of Jesus and his disciples.

Jesus's obedience and Judas' betrayal present opposite poles of the divine-human relationship. For Jesus's obedience reveals the fullness of divine love, while Judas's betrayal reveals the corrupting depths of humanity's sinfulness and self-love. Human sinfulness, weakness and pride are forms of betrayal as humanity turns away from friendship with God to lesser things or self-love.

Thanks be to God that betrayal is not the final word on the human condition. God's love and mercy is the final word that speaks louder than every small or great human infidelity and betrayal. This is the good news of these holy days we prepare to enter.

This Holy Week may we find in Jesus's passion, death and resurrection the victory of God's love turned to us personally as we bring our weaknesses and betrayals before the redeeming cross of Jesus Christ, and say with gratitude and faith, "speak to me, Lord."



Mass of the Lord's Supper

This mass commemorates the last supper of Jesus Christ with his disciples, when the institution of the priesthood and the Eucharist took place. Holy Thursday Mass marks the end of Lent and the beginning of the Triduum.

What Happens at the Mass of the Lord's Supper?

Holy Thursday is not a holy day of obligation, but attending as a family can be a significant spiritual experience for Catholics. This mass is marked by several significant differences from usual celebrations of Mass:

- 1. The tabernacle is empty.
- 2. Unlike during the rest of Lent, the Gloria is sung.
- 3. There is a washing of the feet after the homily, to remember how Jesus washed the feet of the apostles.
- 4. Additional hosts are consecrated, to provide enough for the Holy Thursday mass and for Good Friday services, when no consecration takes place.
- 5. At the end of mass, there is a procession to a place of repose for the consecrated hosts for Good Friday.
- 6. The altar is stripped of altar-cloths and other ornaments.
- 7. Eucharistic adoration is held at many churches, for some period of time. This is to commemorate keeping watch with Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane.

The Triduum is one event, so also plan to attend Good Friday services and the Easter Vigil. This is our faith. It is so important that we pass it on to our youth in all of its full-

Good Friday of the Lord's Passion Tridium

As we prayerfully participate in the Liturgical Commemoration of the Lord's Passion, know that this day itself is endowed with grace and power. The grace does not come through the sacramental "Memorial" of the Lord's Passion but from the reality encountered in this once-a-year Commemoration. This day itself is a real and sanctifying participation in the fruit of Jesus' saving Sacrifice.

To better understand this, look into your own soul and consider any ways that you have experienced God's grace powerfully and uniquely on Good Friday. Perhaps, in years past, you entered into the Triduum in a prayerful and recollected way. Call that experience to mind, and understand that this deep encounter with our Lord was especially made possible because those days are holy.

As you celebrate Good Friday, understand that the floodgates of Heaven are opened to you in a way unlike any other day of the year. Seize this moment in time. Seize this once-a-year opportunity to enter into our Lord's suffering and death. Do so prayerfully, meditatively, truly, and intentionally. Especially honor the hours between noon and three o'clock. Try to set that time aside for nothing other than prayer and recollection. This day is sanctified. Time is sanctified. By entering into prayer during these hours of sanctified time, you will discover that God is especially present to you.

Read the Passion. Pray the Stations of the Cross. Recite the Sorrowful Mysteries of the Rosary. Gaze at a crucifix. Fast, keep vigil, be attentive, and be open to the abundance of grace our Lord wishes to bestow upon you this Good Friday, especially by participating in the liturgical Commemoration of the Lord's Passion during the sacred hours when our Lord hung on the Cross. This coming Friday, "the figure ceases on the advent of the reality." The reality is here, captured in time, made present to you. Stand before His sacred Cross, and allow His mercy to pour forth upon you from His wounded side. Jesus, I trust in You. https://mycatholic.life/saints/saints-of-the-liturgical-year/good-friday/
